

SEE has a position open for an as needed, part-time contract Architectural Historian to assist with historic structures studies and Section 106 related studies, including identification, documentation and evaluation of historic structures, districts and landscapes, and the assessment of NRHP eligibility and project effects on historic properties. The position includes field survey, research, preparation of historic contexts, completion of state survey forms, identification of consulting parties, attendance of public and agency meetings, rapport with review agencies, mitigation, resolution of adverse effects, and preparation of technical reports. Applicants also may assist with preparation and design of brochures, displays, and exhibits as they relate to historic resources, as well proposal development.

The applicant should have strong knowledge of National Register of Historic Places eligibility criteria; experience conducting historic structure surveys and completing state survey forms, determination of eligibility and determination of effect reports; and be familiar with state and federal historic preservation legislation, including Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), and Section 4(f). Position requires knowledge of regional architectural history, architectural styles, associated social movements and history, as well as a minimum of 2 years experience in survey, identification, documentation and evaluation of historic resources.

The applicant must be well organized, able to work both independently and within a team atmosphere and be willing to travel to field sites as needed throughout the US. The candidate must have strong oral and written communication skills and be comfortable interacting with clients, agencies and the public. Applicant must be well-versed in digital photography and related applications, and proficient in MS Word and Excel.

The candidate must meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for professional qualifications in architectural history, as well as possess a graduate degree in architectural history, historic preservation or closely related field, with coursework in American architectural history required.
