
Golfers braved the rain on Thursday afternoon, while other attendees got a tour of Fallingwater. Still others took a tour (and significant samples) at Glades Pike

GOV. RENDELL AWARDS \$16.6 MILLION FOR PETROLIA AREA PUBLIC WATER SYSTEM

PETROLIA, BUTLER COUNTY: Governor Edward G. Rendell today awarded \$16.6 million under Pennsylvania's Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act to help finance the construction of a public water system that will provide safe drinking water to more than 900 homes, businesses and institutions in the Petroleum Valley in northeastern Butler County.

"This is the largest hazardous sites cleanup project ever in Pennsylvania, with the total cost projected upward of \$40 million," Governor Rendell said. "It is an investment in the health of the people who live here. We are committed to making sure the residents of this valley will never again have concerns about the safety of the water coming out of their taps."

The hazardous sites cleanup program has been providing bottled water to residents without charge since March 2002 after it was discovered that their water wells were contaminated. The well contamination was linked to the historic dumping of industrial waste at approximately 24 sites in Butler and Armstrong counties.

"A system that provides a reliable source of safe, clean water could have an economic ripple effect," Governor Rendell said. "A public water system will likely increase property value in this region. Home insurance costs potentially could drop since fire protection will be significantly improved through fire hydrants. Residents will be able to buy and sell homes with confidence, knowing that contaminated water will not be an issue. A public water system also could encourage economic development—the potential for new businesses and employers to move into the valley, providing jobs and expanding the tax base."

The water system grant was awarded to the Petroleum Valley Regional Water Authority, which represents every impacted municipality in the Petrolia area. The grant allows the authority to move forward with bidding and construction of the new system. The grant will cover the cost of installing a booster pump station, storage tank and distribution system totaling nearly 30 miles, including a 1,000-foot crossing under the Allegheny River. The construction phase is expected to last 12 to 15 months.

Remediation of the first of two dozen disposal areas began last year at the Apple Road site and will resume later this month. Workers will install an impermeable liner and drainage system at Apple Road to prevent further contamination of the groundwater. In addition, this summer the Department of Environmental Protection will conduct investigations into all of the disposal areas, and within the next year will do cleanup work at two more locations, at Kelly Farm and Hemlock Road.

Besides the grant, about \$1 million has been spent so far in the hazardous sites cleanup response, including \$487,778 in bottled water costs.

Highlighting the strategic importance that clean and healthy water resources have in protecting public health and ensuring Pennsylvania remains economically competitive, Governor Rendell's proposed 2004-05 budget proposes to improve watersheds, protect the environment, revitalize communities and create jobs.

GOV. RENDELL AWARDS PUBLIC WATER SYSTEM

Under Governor Rendell's proposed 2004-05 budget, funds from a bond issue would be used to stabilize and expand two key programs: Growing Greener, an initiative begun under Governor Tom Ridge that improves the environment; and the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Fund, signed into law by Governor Robert P. Casey to clean up the worst hazardous sites. The \$800 million bond would be distributed among three areas over four years:

- \$330 million for parks, open space and farmland.
- \$300 million for environmental cleanup.
- \$170 million to revitalize older communities.

The Governor's leadership is a lifeline for the hazardous sites cleanup program. The program's fund, which is the primary funding source for brownfield redevelopment projects, faces an uncertain fiscal future. The fund is drying up as the Legislature voted in 2002 to turn off the flow from the Capital Stock and Franchise Tax, the previously dedicated funding source for HSCA. Without new revenue, the program will be bankrupt in the coming fiscal year. The Hazardous Sites Cleanup Fund has invested more than \$250 million in remediation work at hundreds of hazardous

Bog Turtle Program Update

On June 16th and 17th, PAEP's Bog Turtle Programs Committee held Part II of the training course entitled "Bog Turtles and the Environmental Review Process in Pennsylvania – What Consultants Should Know". Part II was held in the area of Middle Creek and it served as a refresher course for conducting Phase 1 bog turtle habitat surveys in Pennsylvania. It was held to reinforce the lessons learned in Part I session held last October and to complete PAEP's first short course pilot program.

Instructor, Chris Urban of the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, provided a continuation of his lecture on bog turtles, ecology and seasonal variations found within bog turtle wetland habitats. Instructor, Carole Copeyon of the US Fish and Wildlife Service, led the class through an additional project case study, illustrating how consultants need to work with their clients and resource agencies when dealing with the potential of having bog turtles. Field operations leader, Jay Drasher of Aqua Terra, kept the class on schedule with visits to new and previously viewed wetland sites that represent good, marginal, and poor habitats with reference to bog turtles.

Program Chair, Bill Zemaitis of Gannett Fleming, said that tries to capture the essence of the program with slogans. Part I's slogan, He said, "It doesn't get any better than this!", cited how PAEP landed the key agency representatives as instructors. For Part II, with fervor for the practice of herpetology and the required close examination of wetland characteristics, Bill said: "Above all, you have to look around!" Although he did not seem to like the new slogan all that much, the instructors did, and he could not find a better one... so there it is, Bill!

Our first program classroom and fieldwork is now complete; however, exams must still be graded and the committee must consider the course reviews before planning anything further. This work will hopefully be finished by fall. Those interested in this course should notify PAEP by sending your contact information to Elaine Farrell (Email: efarrell@farrell-assoc.com), to be put on the mailing list). Please be aware that this coursework is specifically limited to environmental professionals with certain qualifications and the cost is approximately \$500. PAEP thanks everyone for supporting this training program. If you can identify a need for another program of this kind, in another subject area, and can help put something together, please let us know.

Do you need a new or updated SPCC plan?

The US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires facilities that use, manage and store oil to prepare and implement Spill Prevention, Control and Countermeasures (SPCC) Plans. The SPCC requirements apply to most facilities that have total aboveground oil storage capacity of 1,320 gallons or more.

On July 17, 2002 EPA announced over 100 pages of amendments to the existing SPCC rules. This final rule incorporates revisions proposed in 1991, 1993 and 1997. The amendments include expansion, modification, and clarification of the requirements for SPCC Plans and Facility Response Plans. As a result of these changes, facilities that have existing SPCC Plans must update them to comply with the new regulations by August 17, 2004. A professional engineer must certify the upgraded SPCC Plans. The SPCC amendments require that facility management must review and approve the upgraded SPCC Plans, and provide a commitment of the manpower and equipment needed for implementation.

The EPA amendments are not limited to spill planning. Some facilities will be required to modify their petroleum storage and distribution equipment and spill control systems to comply with more stringent requirements under the amended SPCC regulations. Facility upgrades must be fully implemented by February 18, 2005.

Strict deadlines are fast approaching:

- Modified SPCC Plans for existing facilities: August 17, 2004.
- Plan implementation, including facility modifications and upgrades: February 18, 2005.
- SPCC Plans and implementation for new facilities: February 18, 2005.

The above deadlines reflect extensions recently granted by EPA. It is unlikely that EPA will extend the deadlines again. This information was provided by Alternative Environmental Solutions, Inc.
